Links to Areas of Learning	<p>At this stage children should listen to stories, ask how and why; use the past, present and future tense; talk about the past and present in their own lives and the lives of family members; recognise similarities and differences between families and traditions, objects and materials; and role play and make up stories. There are many opportunities here for children to find out about the past.</p> <p><b><u>Communication and language development</u></b> involve giving children opportunities to experience a rich language environment; to develop their confidence and skills in expressing themselves; and to speak and listen in a range of situations</p> <p><b>ELG 01 Listening and attention:</b> Children listen attentively in a range of situations. They listen to stories, accurately anticipating key events and respond to what they hear with relevant comments, questions or actions. They give their attention to what others say and respond appropriately, while engaged in another activity.</p> <p><b>ELG 02 Understanding:</b> Children follow instructions involving several ideas or actions. They answer 'how' and 'why' questions about their experiences and in response to <b>stories or events</b>.</p> <p><b>ELG 03 speaking:</b> Children express themselves effectively, showing awareness of listeners' needs. They use past, present and future forms accurately when talking about events that have happened or are to happen in the future. They develop their own narratives and explanations by connecting ideas or events.</p> <p><b><u>Personal, social and emotional development</u></b> involves helping children to develop a positive sense of themselves, and others; to form positive relationships and develop respect for others; to develop social skills and learn how to manage their feelings; to understand appropriate behaviour in groups; and to have confidence in their own abilities</p> <p><b>ELG 06 Self-confidence and self-awareness:</b> children are confident to try new activities, and to say why they like some activities more than others; and choose the resources they need for their chosen activity.</p> <p><b><u>Understanding the world</u></b> involves guiding children to make sense of their physical world and their community through opportunities to explore, observe and find out about people, places, technology and the environment</p> <p><b>ELG 13 People and communities:</b> Children talk about past and present events in their own lives and in the lives of family members. They know that other children don't always enjoy the same things, and are sensitive to this. They know about similarities and differences between themselves and others, and among families, communities and traditions.</p> <p><b>ELG 14 The world:</b> Children know about similarities and differences in relation to places, objects, materials and living things. They talk about the features of their own immediate environment and how environments might vary from one another. They make observations of animals and plants and explain why some things occur and talk about changes.</p>					
	<p><b><u>First-hand experiences and pupil offer:</u></b></p> <p>History at Foundation Stage is introduced indirectly through activities that encourage children to explore, observe, think, make decisions and discuss. This is scaffolded through skilful adult interaction. Children will have opportunities to explore a range of historical skills such as discussion, chronology, historical vocabulary, analysis, perspectives and interpretations and empathy.
